#### **ABOUT AFC+A**

Americas for Conservation +the Arts is an environmental non profit advancing community resilience through a citizenry of environmental stewards for public health, and leveraging arts and culture for conservation gains.



A Latino-led, founded 501(c)(3) environmental non-profit, AFC+A is Colorado and Puerto Rico based with an international reach.

#### **OUR CHALLENGES**

We advance a diverse conservation movement for environmental and public health, advocacy, and culturally relevant education initiatives that address the needs of previously underserved and underrepresented communities in the green movement. The Latino community in the US is suffering the brunt of the effects of air pollution and climate change. Statistics show Latinos are at the forefront of the climate crisis and are disproportionately impacted by climate change related issues

- Hispanics were reported as uninsured, compared to 10.4% of non-Latino Whites
- 1 in 5 Latino adults are unable to pay for asthma medicines, furthering the disproportionate impacts of air pollution.
- Of the top 10 most polluted cities in the nation, six count Latinos as 40 % or more of their populations.
- 66% Latinos live in areas that fall below the EPA's air quality safety standards 72% in Colorado.

- Hispanic children are 70% more likely to be admitted to the hospital and twice as likely to die from asthma as non-Hispanics.
- Latinos are 30% more likely to visit a hospital due to asthma compared to non-Latino Whites.
- Latinos are three times as likely to die of asthma.
- Latinos represent the highest uninsured rates of any racial/ethnic group in the US. In 2012.
- Today minorities make up 40% of the US population but only 13% of environmental organizations.
- Latinos are the majority of 200 metropolitan districts in the US and live in areas with high vehicle traffic and power plant activity often violating clean air rules
- Of the country's 58 million Latinos, half live in the 15 worst areas for ground-level ozone pollution-
- Half of the nation's crop and livestock production workers and a third of construction workers are Latinos, working in outdoor jobs that put us at high risk from extreme heat.
- Farm and construction workers who feed us and shelter us account for 60% of job-related heat deaths, and Latinos are three-fold more at risk of dying from the heat on the job than non-Hispanics.

# INTRODUCTION FROM THE DIRECTORS

The history of Americas for Conservation + the Arts is young, somewhat emotional, and filled with longing but its story is very old, almost ancient: the need to reconcile peoples and places for a sustainable future.

We are extremely grateful for the support Americas for Conservation + the Arts (AFC+A) has received throughout recent years helping us grow into the organization that we are today: The first and only Boricua founded and led environmental organization of its size in the United States and one of only a handful of Latino founded and led. Today brown citizens make up 40% of the US population but only 10% of environmental organizations.

Supporting organizations like AFC+A is a direct action to bridge this shameful gap and advance a sustainable future where those sitting at the decision making table regarding the stewardship of our natural resources reflect equity and inclusion. Anything else is not only undemocratic, is bad economics.

2018 was a successful year for our organization. We have continued to tackle environmental problems from many angles and used Arte y Cultura as a communication channel for environmental awareness and shared values, and 60% of these efforts are powered by a volunteer force. All our programs aim at environmental and multicultural education and a diverse, non-segregated, and inclusive conservation agenda.

We have brought impactful change to our communities through ten programs. Several of or initiatives have received multiple national press features, including The Washington Post, The Wall Street Journal, Smithsonian Magazine, Huffington Post, CNN, NBC, ABC, Telemundo, FOX News, The Village Voice.

Between 2016 and 2018, (1) the City of Denver Office of Sustainability Love This Place Award, for our work as community builders (2) the ALEF proclamation by Colorado Governor John Wright Hickenlooper (3) the signed Mayors Monarch Pledge by City of Denver Mayor Michael B. Hancock (4) the City of Denver Mayor's Awards of Excellence in Arts & Culture Imagine 2020.







We believe advancing diversity is the most important conservation strategy and that the richness of our Latino American culture is our most important asset in the work that lies ahead. Our culture is grounded on reverence for Mother Earth. Preservationist and protectionist values resonate in our religions, our social structures, our agricultural practices, and our arts and crafts; especially in our arts. And we know that being good stewards of our natural resources powers sustainable economies and healthy livelihoods.

This is why we at AFC+A are excited for 2019 as we partner with CREA Results, its promotores de la salud movement, and their impactful Unidad de Salud Movil (Mobile Health Unit) to grow our flagship program of environmental health stewards powering families with the capacity to champion the health benefits of connecting to nature and taking on career pathways in conservation to safeguard public health.

And yet, while AFC+A is a Puerto Rican & Latino based organization, our expanding organization of volunteers, supporters and donors continues to grow in its diversity. Our team of over twenty professional leaders is half women and represents 7 Countries of the Americas. Mother Earth provides the air we breathe and the water we drink without any consideration of race, color, nationality or religion. 



#### **U-CAN**



Launched in 2017, the summer camp of Promotores Verdes, United Cultures for Arts + Nature Green Ambassadors powers the next generation of diverse leaders by igniting a deep-rooted and lasting passion for conservation anchored in science, arts, and culture.

The one week long outdoors immersion camp offers a curriculum built to empower youth to take action in their communities to promote healthy lifestyles, sustainable practices, environmental stewardship, and skills for outdoors recreation interpretation and leadership. U-CAN provides these young ambassadors with support through mentorship and fosters self expression and growth.

This environment enables students to enhance emotional intelligence, navigate adversity, build personal resilience, and strength in themselves that is necessary to protect our resilient natural world and its limited resources.

# Advancing a culture of recreation, conservation, and public health anchored in nature experiences and a sustainable outdoors economy

This unique intergenerational program integrates CREA Results' Community Health Promoters work and AFC+A's arts- and culture-infused environmental educational programming. Promotores Verdes grows employable champions of the health benefits of connecting to nature, forging career pathways in outdoors recreation, conservation, and stewardship of our natural resources.

The program educates on the interdependence of human and environmental health and our need to protect the natural resources that safeguard the health of our families and communities.

The curriculum is mediated through outdoors experiences and integrates Leave No Trace principles, healthy lifestyle choices, active living and fitness, Get Outdoors campaigns, restoration activities, careers pipeline education, shared meals, and community circles. As in the Promotores Verdes youth program, U-CAN Green Ambassadors, community circles encourage the development of personal and community resilience.







#### **Puerto Rico Resilience Project**



AFC+A launched the Resiliency Fund and its Guagua Solidaria (solidarity bus) with farming brigades to help revitalize local food systems and the agro ecology sector of the island within 72 hours of Hurricane Maria's landfall.La Guagua Solidaria-- a 24 months campaign to assist in the recuperation of 200 agroecology farming projects-- came to life as a repurposed old eco tourist van outfitted with a handmade roof rack and a mobile tool shed.

Powered by volunteer force, the Guatemalan born movimiento "campesino a campesino" solidarity approach, and a holistic strategy of relief support, the bus has In brigade form impacted sixty five food projects in its first year by not only restoring and rehabilitating, but also by increasing the sustainability of systems. La Guagua builds latrines, prunes trees, sets up rainwater catchment systems—pushes polyculture and crop diversity with heirloom seeds, supports in development of waste management systems to increase nutrient recycling and improve biological farm processes (including composting techniques and humanure), and advances reforestation efforts (with a focus on pollinators), all depending on the needs of each particular farm.

The inspiring work of the Fund through its eco bus brigades has helped launch multiple resilience initiatives that are now housed under the Puerto Rico Resilience Project (PRRP).

Through AFC+A's current five year master agreement with the US Forest Service (2016-2021) that includes an expansion contract for food security literacy on the island (2018-2020) PRRP will be growing sister buses for advancing educational initiatives to promote community resiliency. As of December 2018, AFC+A Puerto Rico is leading ten resiliency projects in Puerta de Tierra, Santurce, Toa Baja, El Bicicano in Cano Martin Pena, Las Monjas, Camuy, Orocovis.

Our projects are in partnership with multiple collaborators such as USFS, The Conservation Fund, UMET, University of Puerto Rico, G8, USFS Institute of Tropical Forestry, Brigada Puerta de Tierra, Unidos por Puerto Rico, Municipality of Camuy, Association de Agricultores Camuyanos, Festival de la Palabra, Para La Naturaleza, Boricua, Centro Comunal Villas del Sol, El Ancon, Loiza, among others.

- A Latino-led solution generator, incubator, accelerator-anchored in social capital.
- A binational group of experts that enjoy working together to develop and implement transdisciplinary solutions from soups to nuts for the betterment of our communities.
- An approach that brings multiple disciplines and angles to solution-making, including a profoundly integrated sense of the needs and aspirations of local communities.
- Work from a river basin, watershed-level.
- Training of citizens and stakeholders in the full project cycle of complex planning processes and projects: from solution generation to implementation, measurement and verification, and adaptive management.

- Acknowledging that yesterday's solutions are poor fits for today's and tomorrow's problems. (E.g., climate change and innovation mean the old patterns no longer apply.)
- Advancing sensitivity to diverse cultures with issues (related to conservation) whose solutions need cultural sensitivity.
- Designed to "jumpstart" planning processes and build local capacity, but not to dominate from the outside.
- Reliable partners that can be fast in to aid and advise, and then out when not needed.


#### **Puerto Rico Solidarity Brigades**

#### **Guagua Solidaria 1.0**

October 2017 - October 2018
The Puerto Resilience Fund and The Guagua Solidaria is a 24 months, 200 food projects, primarily benefiting farmers and the communities that are served by them while at the same time advancing the restoration and protection of the natural resources and ecosystems that are critical for long-term food security of rural and urban communities in Puerto Rico. In its first year the Guagua concentrated on immediate relief efforts powered by a core staff of five members and volunteer brigades that were often foreign and not Puerto Rican based.

#### Guagua Solidaria 2.0

November 2018 - April 2020
After a first year audit of vision and impact, AFC +A reconfigures the structure of the brigades to include only one core staff-rather than five-and sub contract professional staff for the specific needs of each farm. Brigades' volunteers are recruited from open convocatory in each municipality and near region advancing in the process AFC+A's Promotores Verdes program. Phase two reduces cost of each brigade by 75% and considerably increases rate of response to the farm and quality of service/professionalism and support given to the farmer. This phase also builds more capacity for Puerto Rican' paid volunteer worker force.






